District 22-D has received \$85,000 in grants.

The Melvin Jones Fellows and the Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows were recognized. There have been 936 Melvin Jones Fellows awarded in 22-D, over 110 of whom are Progressive Fellows. All recipients' names are listed on a wall at the LCIF office in Chicago and if you

ever go there, take time to find your name. PC Chair Rowe ended by reminding us that "The more we do for others, the more we do for ourselves."

LCIF's "The Four Pillars of Service"
...and why we can all be proud to be Lions.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) supports and develops international humanitarian programs that serve people in need. With the dedication and work of Lions, LCIF is able to improve millions of lives through our high-impact initiatives.

Our international humanitarian programs are focused in four main areas:

Preserving Sight

Since its inception in 1990, the SightFirst program has played a key role in reducing global blindness. It is only through the collaborative efforts of Lions, our partners, local health authorities, eye care professionals and other non-governmental organizations that SightFirst has been able to help 30 million people have improved or restored vision. SightFirst serves as a leading member of VISION 2020, the global initiative for the elimination of avoidable blindness.

With a focus on building comprehensive and sustainable eye care systems, SightFirst provides funding for projects that deliver eye care services, build or strengthen eye care facilities, train professionals and build awareness about eye health in underserved communities. Through two fundraising campaigns, Lions are investing \$415 million in the SightFirst program to extend its services to even more people in need throughout the world. With an average cost of just \$6 to help restore a person's vision or prevent blindness, millions more will be given the gift of sight.

Supporting Youth

Over the past 25 years, 12 million young people in 78 countries have benefited through Lions Quest, our youth development program for kindergarten through 12th grade.

Providing Disaster Relief

LCIF's commitment to disaster relief goes back to our beginnings, when we awarded our very first grant for flood relief in South Dakota. Whenever and wherever disasters strike, Lions are often among the first to offer aid—and LCIF is right there with them, ready to support their efforts with funding assistance through Lions disaster relief programs.

Working together, LCIF, local Lions and Lions leaders assess the urgent needs and quickly deliver the aid most required by victims. This grassroots model has proven effective in tragedies around the world, such as the Southeast Asia tsunami, September 11th and the Haiti earthquake.

Lions know that disaster can affect anyone's community, whether it's halfway around the world or right at home. That's why in the last 10 years, LCIF has provided more than \$100 million for disaster relief programs worldwide.

Meeting Humanitarian Needs

LCIF is active in a variety of international humanitarian efforts, such as supporting the construction of homes for the disabled, providing vision screenings to Special Olympics athletes and combating measles.


Dear Fellow Lions,
