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
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
#### Lions Vision Research Foundation

Recently, a celebration was held at the Wilmer Eye Institute at John Hopkins in Baltimore, MD. Lions from Multiple District 22 came together to celebrate 20 years of achievement at the Lions Vision Center (LVC)of the MD 22 Lions Vision Research Foundation (LVRF.)



Through the LVC, the Lions Vision Research Foundation

and Wilmer are committed to supporting low vision research and rehabilitation to minimize the disability caused by low vision and blindness. Low vision refers to vision impairment that cannot be corrected with conventional eyeglasses, contact lenses, medication or surgery. It is most often caused by age-related eye conditions such as macular degeneration, glaucoma and diabetic eye disease.

Vision rehabilitation services aim to optimize the patients' remaining sight. Low Vision specialists are not able to cure the causes of the vision loss, but instead, they help the patient use his or her remaining vision to its fullest potential. After careful thorough and examination, the physician, therapist, and patient work together to identify daily living concerns and develop an individual rehabilitation plan to improve the patient's ability to function and perform the activities their reduced vision has made difficult.

The Wilmer Eye Institute has long been recognized for bringing together ophthalmologists consistently ranked by their peers as among the finest internationally, with a specially trained and highly experienced team of nurses, technicians and staff cited by patients for their knowledge, responsiveness and sensitivity. Working together, they have established and refined a flexible approach for delivering state-of-the-art ophthalmic care.

Our Club has provided financial support throughout the history of LVRF and this past spring donated \$2,500 in support of the Arnall Patz Professorship by awarding an Arnall Patz Fellowship to our Club founder, Noble Simpson. Dr. Patz was a pioneer in this field having done extensive research into retrolental fibroplsiia- a blinding disease of premature infants. He also

developed one of the first laser instruments for the treatment of retinal blood vessel diseases. As Director of the Wilmer Eye Institute, Dr. Patz had a longstanding relationship with Lions Clubs. When he passed away in March, 2010, his family decided that the most meaningful tribute would be to link his name to the Lions through an endowed professorship fund to be held at the Wilmer Eye Institute.

At the 20th anniversary celebration, the Fenwick Island Lions Club presented a check for \$1,000 to LVRF as its annual contribution. We can all be very proud of the investments we have made over the years—that in some small way—have improved the quality of life of those served by the Wilmer Eye Institute and Lions Vision Center.


#### **Carol Freeman**
