We tackle even larger projects and address significant social and economic issues, statewide, nationwide and worldwide...



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
### Club Party at the Clarion

# For Homebound and Lonely Seniors, Meals on Wheels Volunteers Are Like Family By Dave Crum

Our responsibility is to deliver meals to elderly shut-ins and disabled persons in the area between Roxana and Fenwick Island every weekday. We normally have ten teams regularly scheduled for

one or two days every month and one team handles every Wednesday. Also we normally have about four other teams able to do occasional substitutions when needed.

This program is now developing its usual problem this time of year — when the Snowbirds head out of town and other distractions or disabilities occur that imperil our ability to deliver regularly. We are always grateful to enlist more volunteers to do this very important service to ease the load on some of the others. However, right now there is an urgent need for three more volunteers to help in January and two volunteers from then to May and possibly beyond that time.

Many of the Lion's programs are fund raisers to provide for student's scholarships and other

community endeavors. This Meals on Wheels program is the only one that involves direct contact with the needy on a daily basis throughout the year. Because delivering this food is a one-on-one

effort, it is very gratifying to experience the joy and thankfulness in those receiving our deliveries. If time permits, brief visits are possible to learn of any other needs of these people. In some cases we may be the only persons these people can talk to each day. Some of our volunteers go beyond the call of duty at times when they see a special need or problem arise that needs to be reported or where additional assistance can be given. Our Meals-on Wheels volunteers experience an immediate sense of accomplishment when our deliveries are made.

#### LEOs Collect for the Ronald McDonald House

(For those of you who might have missed the November 23<sup>rd</sup> article in the Coastal Point newspaper—or my recent e-mail—I wanted to provide you with the details of the LEOs latest service initiative, as reported by Laura Walter, reporter for the Coastal Point. This initiative also inspired Sharon Schoonover to obtain 50 dental hygiene paks from Bethany Dental Associates to supplement the supplies being provided to the

Ronald McDonald House.)

At Indian River High School, the Leo Club knows firsthand how important places like the Ronald McDonald House are to families. Leo Club advisor Laura Quillen stayed at the McDonald House in Wilmington when her own baby needed surgery twice last year. Now 18 months old, baby Brady is doing well, and Quillen found the perfect way to give back.

Students in the Leo Club, a service organization operating under the Lions Club, are asking the community to help collect goods for the McDonald House.

The McDonald House is run like a hotel, but families stay for free and get dinner provided to them. The Quillens only paid a \$15 donation per night to stay in the city near A.I. duPont Hospital for Children. Basic toiletries are found in

each room, but busy parents who forget anything can get additional supplies, from snacks to hairbrushes.

"It's all based on donations. They also do all of the housekeeping," said Quillen, who knows several other locals who have benefited from the McDonald House.

"The Ronald McDonald House gives so much to the people that do stay there," said Gopika Lakshmanan, Leo president. "It's such a great help, because the family's probably worried about paying for expenses like the medical bill. It's just nice to alleviate that stress — of not having to pay for a hotel or something."

The Leo Club is asking students, staff and the public to contribute cleaning supplies, kitchen and household items. That includes Lysol disinfectant, fabric softener sheets, Tupperware, tall kitchen trash bags, paper towels, toilet paper, facial tissues, disinfecting wipes, aluminum foil, dishwashing detergent, sponges and more.

Anyone wishing to contribute can send supplies to school with an IRHS student or deliver it to the high school main office in Dagsboro, labeled for Mrs. Quillen's room. The deadline is Friday, Dec. 14.

After the drive, several Leos will donate the goods in person in Wilmington, possibly getting to meet and play with some of the children.

While Quillen's family only stayed a total of five days, some families have extended visits to the house. "I think the Ronald McDonald [House] is important because it's not a charity I feel that that people think about," said Delaney McMullen, Leo officer. "[Families] are being provided housing and whatnot, but you don't really think about the other things that they might need."

The drive is expanding the Leo Club activities as their membership increases. "It's good to start new activities, because we were in this mode of just repeating activities year after year, and it was just refreshing to see a new activity being added in," said Brooke Prendergast, Leo officer.

IR Leo Club will also adopt a family in need at John M. Clayton Elementary School, providing clothes and toys to brighten their Christmas.

"We're trying really hard to get really involved with the community, and we've had a successful fall so far," said Quillen. "We hope to keep going."

(While the December 14<sup>th</sup> deadline for collecting items is well past, the LEOs plan another drive in the Spring and I am sure they would welcome contributions to their efforts at any time. What a wonderful program for both the recipients and the LEO members themselves. Congratulations Laura and Amy!)
