


President's Message

Six Scholarships Awarded to Deserving Indian River High School Seniors

This year, the Fenwick Island Lions Club awarded scholarships, collectively amounting to \$8,000, to six uniquely qualified seniors of the Indian River High School.

In the first part of May, the Club's Scholarship Committee interviewed 14 applicants for the awards. The committee consisted of Lions John Furlow, Bob Pretty and Bruce and Sharon Schoonover who were all supported by PP Fran Pretty who oversaw the application and scheduling process. It was the collective sentiment of the committee, that each and every one of the applicants could have been awarded these scholarships because

outstanding achievements. The committee uses criteria which include consideration of academic standing, financial need, community



The \$4,000 John Furlow Scholarship this year was awarded to Emily

Bergman who will be attending Lynchburg College in the fall. Emily has been an active member of the Leo Club throughout her high school career and was also the




recipient of our Club's special award two years ago which enabled her to attend a summer leadership program at Princeton University. This scholarship is paid-out at \$1,000 per year for four years.

The \$1,000 Noble Simpson Scholarship—named for the founder of our Club was awarded to William Brown who will be attending Delaware Tech later this year. William, who is originally from South Carolina, has achieved much since moving to Delaware and attending Indian River. He is also a very personable and polite young man who has demonstrated an admirable work ethic.

This year the Club ear-marked an additional \$3,000 for three \$1,000

scholarships. The first was awarded to Lucy Rinker who will be attending University of Delaware this fall. Lucy has also been active in the Leo Club and served as its President this year. She also has excelled academically and has achieved a well rounded four year high school experience.



The second Club scholarship was awarded to Ryne Dudley who will be attending West Chester University where our chairman John Furlow was a coached for many years. Ryne will be majoring in music after an outstanding high school career which included school soccer and as a volunteer in TOPS, a club that helps mentally challenged youth have fun playing soccer and to make friends. He has also volunteered for many projects in the community including helping to rebuild a homeless shelter. Of course, music is his love and he has been a member of the county and all-state bands.

Our third recipient was Kevin Rowe, who will be attending the University of Delaware this fall with the ultimate goal of becoming a biomedical engineer.

Kevin has excelled in soccer. He also has volunteered many hours in the community, particularly for Justin's Beach House where he installed irrigation, sod and landscaping. He is a well grounded young man who we believe deserves our support.

Finally, the Club is most fortunate to once again have the financial support and the interest of Ce Higgins—the wife of Fenwick Island Club member Skip Higgins. Each year Ce has chosen to honor Skip's memory by presenting a scholarship for \$1,000 in his name. This



year the committee chose to award this scholarship to Jennifer



Clark who will be entering Shenandoah University in Winchester, VA, where she will begin an ambitious eight-year program to become a pharmacist. In high school she excelled in her academics and showed initiative and strong leadership qualities.

The Club has had a long history of supporting the youth of our community. This includes being the sponsor of the Indian River High School Leo Club—a club devoted to the promotion of humanitarian services and good fellowship among young people, and a vision screening program designed to identify eye problems, such as amblyopia and other childhood vision disorders, in pre-school age children. The Club also identifies and addresses specific needs within our community—such as our recent financial support of Justin Lowe after his spinal injury and, of course we have long

financially supported our ongoing scholarship program.

According to Noble Simpson, the Founder of the Fenwick Island Lions Club and a permanent director, the Club has awarded scholarships annually since 1992, and over this period has made available over \$109,000 to local area youngsters to assist them in furthering their education. Of this amount, \$91,000 was the direct result of our fundraising efforts and the other \$18,000 represents remembrance/memorial scholarships, which are either the result of the generous contributions made in memory of former Fenwick Island Club Lions, or contributions made by present members who simply wish to financially support this worthwhile program.

Fran Pretty Recognized for her efforts by Lions Clubs International President Sidney Scruggs

At the MD-22 Convention in Salisbury this past month, Past President Fran Pretty was recognized by the International President, Sidney Scrubbs, with an Appreciation Certificate for her service to Lionism. Fenwick Island Lions Club Donates \$2,500 to the Lions Vision Research Foundation in the Name of Club Founder, Noble Simpson

At the May 23rd board meeting, the board of directors unanimously voted to support the Arnall Patz Professorship for The Lions Low Vision Center by making a contribution of \$2,500 in the name of the founder of our Club, and a Past District Governor, Noble Simpson.

The Lions Low Vision Center (LVC) at the Wilmer Eye Institute, John Hopkins University Hospital in Baltimore is a Lions Multiple District 22 project. It is sponsored by the five Districts, with over 300 Clubs, that make up Lions Multiple District 22. The LVC is a pioneer in new clinical approaches to and research in low vision rehabilitation. offering the most advanced solutions and comprehensive clinical studies in this area. Visual impairments that cannot he corrected by medication, surgery, lasers, eyeglasses or contact lenses, are know as low vision, which is the third leading cause of disability in the United States.

Dr. Patz himself was a pioneer in this field having done extensive research into retrolental fibroplsiiaa blinding disease of premature infants. He also developed one of

the first laser instruments for the treatment of retinal blood vessel diseases. As Director of the Wilmer Eye Institute, Dr. Patz had a longstanding relationship with Lions Clubs. When he passed away in March, 2010, his family decided that the most meaningful tribute would be to link his name to the Lions through an endowed professorship fund to be held at the Wilmer Eye Institute.

Dr, Patz's former patients, colleagues, students, and friends have come together to honor him with monetary gifts to create the "Arnall Patz, M.D. Professorship for the Lions Low Vision Center." At John Hopkins, endowed professorships are especially important to its mission of teaching, research and service.

The LVC has also established a program whereby with a donation of \$2,500, a club may recognize an individual with an Arnall Patz Fellowship. The board of directors thought it would be a fitting tribute to honor the founder of our club, Noble Simpson, who through his leadership these past 24 years has exemplified the Lions Clubs International mission of service to others.

This fall, our Club will organize a trip to the Wilmer Eye Center so that our members can better appreciate the type research the institute is engaged in and see first-hand examples of the programs designed to improve the lives of the visually impaired and help make them more independent.
