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
### Youth Vision Screening Program

This past fall our Lions Zone, consisting of our club, Lord Baltimore, Millsboro and the Laurel Lions

Club—with the financial assistance of the Delaware Lions Foundation—acquired a new, state of the art, vision screening device called the "Spot." From the start, it was a huge hit with all of our volunteers because you can quickly screen both of a child's eyes simultaneously and it instantly records and prints out the complete eye examination results.

It was also a huge hit with the school nurses and preschool administrators because of the machine's ability to identify accurately those children with childhood vision disorders. For example, at a screening in Georgetown, nine children were identified for follow-up and we subsequently learned that each of the nine were confirmed to need eye wear. The school nurse was ecstatic and wondered out loud if we could do a screening for all the elementary school children, recognizing the importance of this program.





#### The Fenwick Island Lions Club Awards \$11,000 in Scholarships

On May 22<sup>nd</sup>, in a ceremony at the Indian River High School, the Fenwick Island Lions Club presented scholarships, collectively amounting to \$11,000, to eight uniquely qualified seniors. While fundraising is the club's principle financial source of its community service programs, this year more than \$1,000 was derived from contributions made in memory of former Fenwick Island Club Lions, or contributions made by present members who simply wish to financially support this worthwhile program. Additionally, the family

of a long-time member of the Club, Skip Higgins and his wife Ce, have fully funded an additional \$1,000 scholarship, thus enabling the club to provide financial support to a record high eight individuals.

The Club's Scholarship Committee interviewed 12 applicants for the awards. The committee consisted of John Furlow, Bob Pretty, Bruce and Sharon Schoonover and Club President Jean Bertram. Past President Fran Pretty once again organized the application and scheduling process.

The committee uses criteria which include consideration of academic standing, financial need, community service involvement, extracurricular activities and the ability to communicate well. As John Furlow—the long



serving chairman of the committee said, "The incredibly talented, personable and engaged nature of each and every one of the applicants not only made the selection process difficult, it was agonizing."

Austin Roadarmel University of Delaware \$4,000 John Furlow Scholarship

This year the \$4,000 John Furlow Scholarship was awarded to Austin Roadarmel, son of Tony Roadarmel of Selbyville. Aside from excelling academically he takes great pleasure in giving back to the community and his musical talents are many. Austin will be attending the University of

Delaware in the fall to pursue his interest in biology.

\$1.000 Noble The Simpson Scholarship—named for the founder of

our Club, was awarded to Jessica Gude, daughter of Karl and Ann Gude of Clarksville. She has been ranked number one in her class academically for three years running. She has also found time to be extremely active in community service and extracurricular activities. Jessica plans to study education and biological sciences at Goucher College in Towson, MD and aspires, one day, "...with her knowledge of nutrition and education to

participate in foreign mission trips, to feed malnourished bodies and minds."

The \$1,000 Skip and Ce Higgins Memorial Scholarship was awarded to



Steven Rozell, son of Thomas and Mary Elleyn Rozell of Frankford. Throughout his high school career he managed to balance, and excel at, his academics, his extracurricular activities, as well as his community service endeavors and his part time work. Steven will attend Delaware Valley College and major in agriculture. He also has a desire to return to Sussex County.

Alexandra Manolakos, daughter of Cheryl Simmons of Ocean View was She finished 10<sup>th</sup> in her class awarded a \$1,000 scholarship. academically and has pursued a diverse set of both academic and

According to Noble Simpson, the founding member of the Fenwick Island Lions Club and a permanent director, the Club has awarded scholarships annually since 1992, and over this period has made available over \$135,000 to local area youngsters to assist them in furthering their education.

#### REPORT FROM THE COMMUNITY OUTREACH COMMITTEE

This year, the Fenwick Island Lions Club has once again focused on reaching out, identifying the needs within our community and offering financial assistance to those individuals and groups with a proven need.

While the ultimate decision to provide financial assistance lies with the board, in most instances we rely on the Pyle Center to help us validate a need. They have a comprehensive interview and an objective financial evaluation process which measures need. The Pyle Center offers this service to the Club at no cost and we

find that their expertise in this area assures that the truly needy are identified. The other advantage of using the Pyle Center is that they are in a position to identify other private, Delaware and/or Federal programs that may be available to assist the individual.

#### Eye Care

The largest request we have is for glasses. We have negotiated a special arrangement with both the Sussex Eye Center of Selbyville and Halpern Eye Care of Millville. The arrangement provides a complete eye exam and either single lens or bi-focal eyewear at a deeply discounted rate. Partnering with these service providers allows us to stretch our funds to the maximum. This



year we provided a comprehensive eye exam and glasses for nine individuals—eight adults and 1 child.

#### **Hearing Aids**

Thanks to the Lions Clubs International Foundation's 'Lions Hearing Aid Recycling Program' (HARP) and the District 22-D Lions organization, we can also offer financial assistance to individuals with limited financial resources who require hearing aids.

Here in Delaware, the hearing aids are provided by 'Easy Listening Hearing Centers' (headquartered in Baltimore) which has an office at the Beebe Health Campus—Medical Arts Center in Rehoboth Beach. This program offers a comprehensive hearing evaluation and hearing aids at a cost to the club of just over \$700. For anyone who has had to purchase hearing aids, you know what an incredible price this is and therefore what a wonderful program we are able to provide to those in need in our community.

We use the same Pyle Center evaluation service to screen applicants for financial need. This year we had two requests for this service and approved one.

#### **Other Community Needs**

Aside from these two programs, we routinely identify and receive requests from both groups and individuals for financial assistance. This past year we were able to build ramps for three individuals, provide assistance to an individual with mobility issues, help two Boy Scouts who had Eagle Scout projects, support the Little League and provided support to Camp Barnes, just to name a few.

Next year, based on the recommendations of our Budget Committee, we will be devoting even more of our financial resources to community based assistance.

# Our 'Meals on Wheels' Program Needs and Deserves Your Support By Larry Kovacs

As the picture attests, the Fenwick Island Lions Club has long been a supporter of the Meals on Wheels program. In Sussex County, this program is operated out of the Pyle/CHEER Center, in Roxana.

The goals of the MOW program are to (1) help seniors remain independent; (2) help them maintain their nutritional health; (3) act as a referral agency; and (4) help seniors live their lives with dignity. Most recently it has been chaired by John Carl, David Crum and in January, I once again took over.



Throughout its 'life' the program's success has been dependent

upon a group of dedicated Lions and their spouses who, week in and week out—year in and year out, have seen the benefit of this program to our community and have given so unselfishly of their time, their energy and the costs they incur. Looking back, in the beginning we only delivered meals four days a week because

of our Lions meeting on the first and third Monday of the month. We also had only enough drivers to cover four days. In approximately the year 2000 we were able to add more drivers to the list and were able to add Mondays to the delivery schedule. More recently, we have also looked outside the club's membership in order to be able to fulfill our year round obligations. Today we have 15 drivers sharing the load. Seven are 'regular drivers' with a commitment of 2 or more days per month; five are



'alternate drivers' who are available as needed; two are listed as "need driver" or "driver only" and one is on hold due to his wife's health issues.

We need more help!!! Of the 15 drivers, only ten are Lions. We are not asking for more than 1 or 2 days per month and we will see that you are familiar with the route before you are asked to go out on your own. Depending on the number of meals to be delivered, the run will take between 1 1/2 and 2 ½ hours. The Pyle/Cheer Center has requested that we don't get there before 9:30 AM because sometimes the food has not gotten there.

Please give this your consideration... This is an incredibly important program and it offers an opportunity to bring some joy and nourishment into the lives of our housebound neighbors. And, for us it is chance to experience a good deal of personal satisfaction.
