


Fenwick Island Lions Club

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After much discussion at the April 23rd board meeting, it was decided to award a total of seven scholarships this year. We will be giving the traditional \$4,000 scholarship named in honor of the long serving chairman of the Scholarship Committee—John Furlow, a \$1,000 scholarship in the name of the Club's founder Noble Simpson, and another one for \$1,000 honoring the memory of long time member Skip Higgins. In addition to these three, and based on our club's financial condition, the board authorized an additional four \$1,000 scholarships.

During the year, we received \$990 in donations earmarked for scholarships in honor and/or in memory of members or past members. The board voted to round this amount off to \$1,000 and once again offer a scholarship in honor of Skip Higgins. For many years, the scholarship in Skip's name had been funded by his wife Ce, but she passed away this winter and the board felt that it would be a nice tribute to both she and Skip if a scholarship was given in his name once again.

The board also recognized that as a result of several past recipients not receiving the full benefit of the scholarships awarded—for various reasons, the Club had built up a reserve in excess of what is required. Recognizing the economic times we are in, the ever increasing cost of higher education and importance of providing support to the youth of our community, the board unanimously approved funding above that which had been budgeted for this purpose.

This year we have received eleven applications from Indian River High School seniors vying for the scholarships. On Tuesday, May 1st, the Scholarship Committee, consisting of John Furlow, Bob Pretty, Bruce and Sharon Schoonover, along with Club President Jean Bertram will interview each of the applicants. The committee uses criteria that considers academic standing, financial need, community service involvement, extracurricular activities and ability to communicate. LEO Club membership and active participation definitely weigh heavily in the applicants favor. The winners will be announced at an awards ceremony at the high school, which is scheduled for the evening of May 23rd. **The ceremony begins at 7 PM in the auditorium and Lions are invited and encouraged to attend and show their support for this program.**





Harris Teeter is offering a program which supports local schools. The program is called "Together in Education." It awards money to registered schools (each school must register with Harris Teeter.) If you have a VIC card at Harris Teeter, all you have to do is ask the check-out person to register you for your school of choice (it can be up to 5



schools per person) and they can register you and your school will get credit. <u>Please note, in order to receive credit, you must register prior to doing your shopping.</u>

Only Harris Teeter Brand Products or produce are eligible for the cash awards. They will distribute funds earned three times within the school year. The money earned must be \$25 or more for Harris Teeter to issue a check. If less, they will carry over the amount until the next quarter. The last payment this year will be in June. Each school year each school must re-register with Harris Teeter.

It is not too late to help support our local schools. Indian River High School, Phillip C. Showell and Selbyville Middle School are registered for this year for this program. Let's all sign up and help earn money for your school(s) of choice. I checked on the internet and to date: Indian River High School has 44 participants earning a total of \$596.75.
