Come join the fun, fellowship and fine food at our annual picnic to be held once again at the new and improved facilities at Holts Landing State Park, Millville, DE. beginning at 12 Noon on Thursday, October 7th

This is a catered affair and all you have to do is bring yourself, your spouse, a guest or a friend. Lion Jim Stone promises a good time and some games for the young at heart!

Holts Landing is an undiscovered facet of the Diamond State's park system. The 203-acres area contains a variety of beautiful landscapes, from bay shore beach to grassy fields and hardwood forests. The property has a long recorded history as a small family farm. The Holt family maintained a farm with a bayshore boat landing on this site until 1957, when the property was sold to the state highway department. Then, in 1965, the first parcel of land was transferred to



the State Park Commission, forming Holts Landing State Park It is home to the only pier on Delaware's Inland Bay that was built specifically for crabbing. The sturdy pier opened in 2001 and overhangs the shallow bay waters, allowing crabbers and anglers alike to fish for blue crabs and other mid-Atlantic delicacies.



Fenwick Island Lions Book Mark

As reported this past month, as a direct result of the idea given to us by Dr. Chris Bennett, President of the Belize City Lions Club, our board decided that we should create our own—Fenwick Island Lions Club book mark. Our vision was to do so in a way that was economical enough so the that the book mark could be used as a promotional give-away at our fundraising events and/or on other occasions—such as when we participate in our vision youth screening activities, at Leo Club events, when selling raffle tickets for Selbyville Halloween our Parade and/or provided to local libraries for their patrons.

The board approved the design of the book mark and an order was placed in late August. We have now received them, and even if we do say so ourselves, we think they came out very well! The front and back are shown here, with both the Lions Clubs International Logo and our Club's patch prominently on display. The finished size is 7.25 inches long by 2 inches wide. It is done on a heavy card stock with a high gloss and coated finish. If you have additional ideas on how we can use these book marks to promote our club and increase its visibility within the communities we serve, please let a member of the board know your idea.

Our thanks to King Lion Dr. Chris Bennett for the idea, to Lion Jim Miles for bringing



Lion John Carl Passes the Baton



According to John, this was a truly bittersweet moment.

We are indeed most fortunate to have had the untiring efforts of John and Barbara for the past twelve years. We are also very lucky that Lion Dave Crum is willing to step-up his efforts with the program and assume

the responsibility of committee chair. Of the experience of being a member of the Meals on Wheels team, Dave says that "...to deliver and interact with so many people on a regular basis, is probably the most satisfying experience I have had with the Lions Club." He and his wife Kay have been helping to deliver meals for the past six years. And, we are also blessed to have a new couple—Ash and Jacquie Ashinhurst, join dedicated group of volunteers. The Fenwick Island Lions Club has long been a supporter of the Meals on Wheels program in Sussex County. The program's goals are to (1) help seniors remain independent; (2) help them

We are lucky to have a combination of Lions, spouses, and non-Lions which form our dedicated Meals on Wheels team. This group is responsible for currently delivering hot meals to some thirteen households each day. Members of the Lions Club, along with dozens of other county volunteers, have been making these rounds for more than 25 years here in Sussex County. They can be seen delivering meals year-round, five days a week through heat and cold, rain and snow.

Bob & Patti Schlauch and Jim Stone serve as alternates.

Long Time Member Dr. Lou Friedner Passes

The Parade

Continuing a 60+ year tradition in Selbyville, the annual Lions Club Halloween parade will be held Wednesday evening, October 27th beginning at 7 PM. And, once again Lion Fran Pretty and Lion Jean Bertram are making sure it all goes smoothly.

The Theme

While the primary thrust of this year's parade is—as it has been in the past—children, costumes, bands and fun, we are adding a theme this year which is "Sight Night."

Lions Clubs worldwide are best known for their sight and vision work—whether it be providing glasses for those in need, administering a vision screening test for children to detect childhood vision disorders or raising funds to support vision research. Lions also address such other sight issues including, cataracts, glaucoma, diabetic retinopathy, corneal transplants, river blindness and trachoma.

At this year's parade, members of the Indian River High School Leo Club—a Lions Club sponsored service

organization which emphasizes community

service, will be collecting used eyeglasses. These eye glasses are ultimately distributed to those in need in developing countries. The Leos will also be distributing a brochure that highlights this basic, but highly successful and appreciated Lions Club program.

Food Pantry Collections by Club

community who were in need.

We find that the economic situation has changed little from last year, so we would like to continue this program. You should know that food items collected are divided between two local programs, one at the Roxana Pyle Center and the other is the Community Food Bank in Selbyville, DE. The Community Food Bank is located at the Salem United Methodist Church in Selbyville. It is currently distributing food products on the third Saturday each month. The food is also distributed on an emergency basis, as requested. The purpose of the Pantry is to provide basic food items to those in our



community who are unable to purchase enough food to see them through to the end of the month. All contributions are greatly appreciated.

New Recycling Bin for Hockers & Fenwick Town Hall

Thanks to the ongoing efforts of Lion Sam Mooney and Lion Joe Diehl, we have been able to build two new can bins this summer, a 4'x4' at Fenwick Town Hall—to replace the old 4'x8' because of the reduced quantities of cans there, and a new one to replace the old 4'x8' bin for Hockers Super Center, which was in very bad condition.
